1. Jahresrückblick

Liebe HMD e.V. Mitglieder,

aufgrund der einfacheren Bearbeitung beziehen sich ab nun der Jahresrückblick und die Jahresüberschussermittlung auf das Kalenderjahr. Das führt dazu, dass sich einige Berichte aus diesem Jahresbericht und dem Vorjahresbericht überschneiden würden. Daher wurde ich Euch bitten, die Aktivitäten des Vereins bis Mai im alten Jahresbericht 2013/2014 nachzulesen, so dass ich hier nur von den Aktivitäten des restlichen Jahres berichten werde.

Schule und Klinik

Die Ausplanung des Wasserver- und -entsorgungssystems durch Jens Kühlbrey und Kristina von Bomhard wurde im Rahmen eines Seminars im Sommersemester abgeschlossen. Auch die Ausarbeitung des Entwurfs wurde weitestgehend abgeschlossen, auch wenn noch einige Schritte zur letztendlichen Realisierbarkeit fehlen.

Der den Entwurf betreuende Architekt Tobias Dietz erstellte eine Übersicht über die vor der Realisierung nötigen Schritte:

- A) Entwurfsphase (Maßstab 1:100)
 - Nochmalige Überprüfung des Konzeptes und endgültige Festlegung auf einen Entwurf
 - Festlegung sämtlicher Oberflächen (Böden, Decke, Wände)

 - Präzisierung der Kosten
 - Terminplan für die nächsten Planungsschritte sowie den angestrebten Bauablauf
 - Einwerben der Geldmittel (inkl. Finanzierung für das notwendige Projektteam, Bauherr, Architekt, Fachplaner)

Umbau des Projektteams vor Ort

Für Muriungi Marete gab es Ende des Jahres 2014 ein großes Erfolgserlebnis. Er erhielt ein hoch dotiertes Stipendium, um in Melbourne, Australien seinen PhD in Sozialer Arbeit auf dem Gebiet der Flüchtlingsintegration zu machen.

Für das Projekt ist das natürlich ein ziemlich großer Verlust, allerdings hat Muriungi dafür gesorgt, dass das Projekt vor Ort weiterlaufen kann und hat zugesagt auch weiterhin als Ansprechpartner zur Verfügung zu stehen. Zuerst wurde die Projektleitung vor Ort vorübergehend von Muriungis Frau Joyce übernommen, die dann die Projektleitung ihrer Schwester Nancy übertrug, als sie im Februar 2015 ebenfalls nach Melbourne zog. Nancy ist nun also vor Ort unsere Projektleiterin und Koordinatorin. Schola, die bis 2013 in unserem Internet Cafe arbeitete und sich als große für das Projektteam erwiesen hat, wurde die Unterstützung Leitung des Kinderpatenschaftsprogamms übertragen. HMD ist nun nicht mehr der einzige Förderverein, der Waisen vor Ort unterstützt, sondern auch die gemeinnützige Organisation von Steve Ralf, Eudamonia aus England unterstützt Kinder im Projektgebiet.

Kim, der sich ebenfalls als engagierter Mitarbeiter erwiesen hat, ist nun mit der Fortführung und Ausweitung der Baumschule beauftragt.

Es wird gegenwärtig ebenfalls geprüft inwieweit sich die Installation von PV und anderen Technologien der nachhaltigen Stromerzeugung wirtschaftlich darstellen lässt. Die Gründung einer lokalen Energiegenossenschaft steht bei positiven Resultaten in Aussicht.

Esther and her family live in very poor conditions

The family uses a private latrine for toilet purposes, which is not in good condition, water is barely enough in the area; they buy the project water for use at home or other times when it rains they store some for use during dry seasons since the area is semi-arid.

Esther is in good health and looking happy. She is in school and now in Grade one. She has maintained an average performance at school. Esther likes reading story books, drawing and singing. She walks to school every day because her school is not very far from home. Esther is grateful for your support and she will soon send you a thank you message.

Family Situation: The children were abandoned when they were still young; the guardian took them in after they were found loitering in the streets with no care. Originally they were three children; the guardian with no means or earning a living sent them to work in the fields to bring in food. The youngest of all, a girl two years of age, would normally be left home with no one to take care of her, sometimes locked in her compound. But one day when everyone else had left, it rained so hard and the little girl drowned and died. These children were taken away to be 'employed' but through the local chief, they were rescued.

Millicent and her Sister Winfred live with their aged guardian who is about 70 years old. She is grateful that the two sisters are happy and like playing games both at school and home. After school they help her with small tasks.

The children are healthy looking although the guardian is HIV positive. (*This information cannot be publicly published because the law in Kenya forbids this to avoid discrimination*). She is spending a lot

of money in order to buy the daily medication that she has to take. Through your sponsorship, Winfred and Millicent are now in school, both in Grade four and have improved their performance in school. The family lives in extremely poor conditions, in a small rental house which they all share. Through your support, they have school fees, uniforms, stationery, and some bedding. They shall send you a thank you message soon.

After his death the mother abandoned her five children leaving them with their grandparents, Adrian Kaaria Miriti and his wife who now take care of the five kids. They do not work and this makes it difficult for them to take care of the little ones.

The children are healthy and looking happy. The five kids are now working hard and the teachers helping them through remedial teaching, which we hope will help improve in their performance.

Greetings to you all from Kenya from Hakuna Matata Inklusive staff and all the groups that you are supporting. They also asked us to express their gratitude for all the help you have extended to them.

WOMEN GROUPS' REPORT

Karimi Women Group

Group background

This group is composed of 20 members so far who are mainly peasant farmers and casual labourers.

The group activities include;

- Tree planting for environmental conservation
- Do manual work for pay on farms, and during community occasions like weddings and funerals
- Lend money either to their group members or non-members at an interest
- Charitable and community work

Group progress;

- They have rental houses within the market
- They have managed to buy two plots within market centre
- .They managed to plant trees for environmental conservation at Murangine primary school
- The group has been able to start table banking

Hakuna Matata Intervention

- Gave the group seed capital of Kshs. 10,000 which they used for table banking
- The group was empowered on leadership and group dynamics

Benefits

From this money they started table banking, they lend money among members at an interest rate of 10%. The members are extremely happy and proud of the project.

The members have benefited in various ways such as

- The group has been able to make an interest of kshs.12100
- They have been able to buy seedlings to plant in their farms thus increasing production
- Some members borrowed and were able to rent small farms to farm
- Some members bought livestock egchicken,goats,sheepetc
- They have been able to borrow from the group and pay school fees for their children
- Bought household items they didn't have eg utensils
- Start small businesses eg green grocery
- They have also improved leadership skills from our training

The members were so encouraged our initiative and decided that each member will be contributing Kshs 50 per month to add to the table banking kitty??.So far the members have contributed kshs.4700.

Challenges faced by members

- Cash shortage as members are willing to borrow more but not enough money for all members to borrow at the same time.
- They lack record keeping skills

Future plans

- Ensure that every member owns a sheep
- Plan to turn their semi permanent houses into permanent houses
- With time to develop their other plot at murangine

Seed capital payment

So far the group has repaid kshs.6000 and they plan to clear the balance by March 2015.

Tumaini Women Support Group

Currently composed of 21 members who are mostly HIV positive.

The group activities include:

- Table banking,
- Poultry keeping
- Care and support
- Group therapy
- Offer home based care for the bedridden
- Offer support to the HIV AIDS orphans(so far around 40 kids) with school fees, uniforms and bedding.
- Making and selling affordable jewellery eg necklaces

Group progress;

- Run a successful table banking ,making a profit of kshs .6800
- Started monthly contribution of kshs 100 per member. So far they have raised 7100 has been added to the table banking kitty.

Hakuna Matata Intervention

Held a 1 day seminar for the members in which we invited a specialist, she took the members through several important topics such as:

- Acceptance
- Positive living
- Hygiene
- Nutrition
- Adherence especially to drugs.
- Members were also able to open up to share their experiences and ask questions

The group members were extremely grateful for the information as most of them had not attended any counseling and requested one more session to address other issues.

- With the incubator now working they plan to expand poultry keeping
- Plan to rent a piece of land as a group for farming.

Have paid shs 2000 in 2015

WADHIKT - ISIOLO WOMEN'S GROUP

This group currently has 20 members both Christians and muslims. They have become a symbol of unity in Isiolo region which had been marred by religious and ethnic conflicts. The group activities include;

- Table banking
- Merry go round
- Selling goats and livestock
- Farming
- Selling fabrics and tailoring
- Selling camel milk

Hakuna matata inklusive intervention

- Given the group seed capital of Kshs. 10,000 for their table banking.
- The group was empowered on leadership and entrepreneurship.

Benefits

- Were able to make a profit of Kshs.4300 from table banking
- They expanded their fabrics and tailoring hence new jobs for the group members
- Have also expanded the goats business also employing members
- The group has a strong leadership and proper record keeping.
- Members have borrowed are able to buy drought resistant crops hence improved food production.

Challenges

- Lack of sufficient money especially for table banking.
- Isiolo being an arid area crop failure hence losses

Future plans

- To expand their various activities to enable them employ more members, hence improving their standards of living.
- Expand the group by including members from various tribes and religions to enhance peaceful co-existence in an area marred by religious intolerance.

The group cleared the previous seed capital of kshs.10000 and negotiated a new loan of kshs.30000. The members proposed to pay in 5 months ie end of June 2015.

NKATHA WOMEN'S GROUP

This is a group composed of 28 hardworking and self driven women. Most of them are small scale farmers.

Hakuna Matata Inklusive gave them kshs. 10,000 which was used to start table banking.

This money has benefitted them personally and as a group in the following ways;

- They were able to buy drought resistant tomato and onion seedlings, this enabled them increase their harvest. Some members were able t make up to kshs 7000.
- Members were able to afford fertilizers for their crops
- Started small poultry business
- Some members bought goats for their families
- Enabled members pay school fees for their kids
- Bought household utensils
- Members have also bought 28 seats so far which they hire out

The group has made a profit of kshs.9070 from table banking. They also contribute 100shs monthly which totals to kshs 8000 which is also used for table banking.

Challenges

- Poor leadership
- Insufficient money especially for table banking

Future Plans

- Expand table banking
- Hire a piece of land to plant tomatoes and onions for the group

WIDOWS AND WIDOWERS SHG

This group is composed mainly of peasant farmers from a semi arid area between meru and Isiolo. Currently there are 78 active members in the group.

The group activities include;

- Support most needy widowed women and their children in their community through economic activities like table banking.
- Farming
- Promote dairy goat keeping.
- Promote group therapy through social dialogue.
- Merry go round

Hakuna matata inklusive intervention

- The group was given kshs.100,000 which they used to start a project of their choice
- Group training through which they were taught leadership skills, group dynamics, financial management, farming of drought resistant crops e.g. cassava which will improve food security. Were encouraged to start other projects such as beekeeping.

Benefits

- The members were able to buy 17 goats,
- Members also started making contributions to enable them buy more goats, so far they have bought 5 more goats.

Challenges

- Very poor group leadership, they have no sense of direction.
- Poor harvest-most members live in a semi-arid area
- Lack of fodder for their goats
- Table banking activity died off-members claim that they can't afford to pay back the monies because of the poor harvest.

Way forward for the group

- Members to start paying off their seed capital, they will do this by contributing ksh.200 per member. So far they have paid kshs.6000
- To start farming drought resistant crops, bee keeping.

KAMBANJA WOMEN GROUP

This group has 52 registered members but currently has 26 active members who are mainly farmers.

Their activities include;

- Table banking
- Monthly member contributions
- Farming

The group has been able to make a profit of kshs.30,000 from table banking.

Members have been able to pay school fees, buy seedlings and fertilizers to improve production, keep livestock such as goats and chicken, starts small businesses such as kiosks in the market.

Challenges

- Scarcity of money as members is only able to borrow small amounts at a time
- Poor production due to a long dry spell in 2013 & 2014
- Tomato farms were affected by a worm hence no harvest.
- Member inability to pay on time due to factor 2 and 3.

Future plan

• To buy dairy cows for every member.

So far the group has been able to pay kshs.8000.

UPENDO SELF HELP GROUP

This group is composed of 25 hardworking women from a very arid region.

The group is involved in various activities including;

- Table banking
- Monthly contribution
- Farming
- Supporting the disabled kids from their region
- Merry go round etc

Hakuna Matata Inklusive gave the group kshs.10,000 which was used in table banking.

The group has been able to make a profit of kshs.6,525.

The group members also contribute shs100 per month, to date they have been able to pool together kshs,19600 which is also used in the table banking.

Members have ben able to benefit individually in various ways;

- Bought small livestock such as dairy goats, chicken.
- Have been able to afford drought resistant tomato and onion seedlings and fertilizers to improve production.
- Start roadside kiosks
- Enabled some group members pay school fees for their kids

Challenges

- Insufficient money to loan to every member at ago
- Poor harvest
- Lack water storage

Future plan

- To buy water storage tank of up to 5000litres for every member as they live in a dry area.
- Hope to start a chicken and goat business.

Upendo SHG paid the kshs.10,000 seed capital and requested for a larger sum. Their kshs. 30,000 is under consideration.

Also members start small businesses such kiosks, shoe repair business etc

Challenges

- Discrimination by family and community
- Lack basic business knowledge and very poor records
- Lack equipment to help them make day to day life better e.g. wheelchairs
